## **UHAND General Updates**

<u>Dr. Chisom Odoh</u> (former UHAND postdoctoral fellow) completed the UHAND program in July and is currently a tenure-track Assistant Professor in the Department of Rehabilitation and Health Services at the <u>University of North Texas</u>! <u>Christine Smith</u> (former UHAND Scholar) also completed the program and is currently working at <u>Change Happens!</u> as a Health Educator for the <u>HYPE 3.0 program</u> – a teen pregnancy prevention program. Change Happens! is a community-based non-profit in Houston's <u>Third Ward</u> that provides programs and services to "empower people to help themselves."

In August, UHAND met with its <u>External Advisory Board</u> (EAB) to share program progress with stakeholders. The meeting featured the in-person attendance of 6 EAB members and select UHAND Scholars who shared their experience working with the program; <u>Dr. Nicole McNeil Ford</u> (Program Officer from the <u>National Cancer Institute Center to Reduce Cancer Health Disparities</u>) also attended remotely.

#### **Scholar Achievements**

Dr. Daphne Hernandez (UHAND Pilot Investigator) also had her research presented at the AACR Conference. Dr. Lorna McNeill (MD Anderson Principal Investigator) and Dr. Dalnim Cho (UHAND Early Stage Investigator) were in attendance as well. Ashley Taylor (UHAND graduate Scholar) with the support of her academic mentor, Dr. Lorraine Reitzel (University of Houston Principal Investigator), recently published her article "Physical Activity and Sleep Problems in Homeless Adults" in the journal PLOS ONE, which led to her feature in a news article written by the University of Houston College of Education.

#### **Education**

We kicked off the fall semester of the UHAND-Komen Cancer Disparities Seminar with a talk from <a href="Dr.RuthRechis-Oelker">Dr.Ruth Rechis-Oelker</a> (Director of the <a href="Be Well Communities">Be Well Communities</a> program) and <a href="Ms. AyoOgunye">Ms. AyoOgunye</a> (University of Houston Alumni Career Counselor). During this quarter, we also continued with the <a href="Professional Development Series">Professional Development Series</a> attended by <a href="UHAND Early Stage">UHAND Early Stage</a> Investigators and <a href="HEALTH Research Institute">HEALTH Research Institute</a> affiliates. <a href="Dr. Courtney Holladay">Dr. Courtney Holladay</a> spoke to attendees in August on "Building Leadership Capabilities." In October, <a href="Ms. Kelly McCormick">Ms. Kelly McCormick</a> spoke on "Networking Strategies and Building an External Reputation."

In July, <u>Dr. Miria Kano</u>, Regional Coordinating Director for GMaP Region 3, shared information about GMaP resources available to UHAND Scholars, Early Stage Investigators, and researchers.

In October, UHAND also helped pilot the *Mechanisms of Exercise in Cancer and Health* seminar hosted by <u>Dr. Emily Lavoy</u>, <u>Dr. Melissa Markofski</u> (UHAND Early Stage Investigator), and <u>Dr. Keri Schadler</u> for <u>University of Houston</u> and <u>MD Anderson</u> students and trainees. The purpose of this seminar series is to share ongoing research between University of Houston and MD Anderson research groups that have common interests in exercise and cancer survivorship.

# Community

In September, the <u>Center for Community-Engaged Translational Research</u>, led by Dr. Lorna McNeill (MD Anderson Principal Investigator), hosted an inaugural conference focused on African Americans and faith-based organizations titled "<u>Eyes Have Not Seen, Ears Have Not Heard: Breakthroughs in Cancer Research.</u>" The conference brought together over 200 church leaders, congregants, health professionals, and cancer experts from across the country to address cancer health disparities in African American communities. UHAND undergraduate Scholars (<u>Sara Flores</u>, Shreya Desai, and <u>Basant Gamal</u>) assisted with the UHAND exhibit table. During the conference, <u>Dr. Shahnjayla Connors</u> (UHAND affiliate) presented her breast cancer reconstruction disparities research conducted with Dr. Lorraine Reitzel (University of Houston Principal Investigator).

In October, Dr. Kayce Solari Williams (UHAND Education Program co-director) was on a Health Q&A panel for the <u>University of Houston Health Students Association</u> where she discussed cancer disparities and how the UHAND program works to address it.

Sara Flores (UHAND undergraduate Scholar) has been working in the community as part of the <u>Active Living After Cancer</u> (ALAC) program, a project led by her research mentor, <u>Dr.</u>

<u>Karen Basen-Engquist</u>, that aims to improve cancer survivors' quality of life by promoting physical activity and providing navigation services related to survivorship. Sara recently conducted informal interviews of community members in the ALAC program. Of the experience, Sara noted, "It was incredible to see the positive impact this program has had on their lives. It reaffirmed my passion for this field of work."

## Research

Dr. Lorraine Reitzel and Dr. Daphne Hernandez recently published a paper titled "Advancing Health Behavior Research and Scholarship through Mentorship of First Generation, Underrepresented Undergraduate Students." The paper provides insight on their perspectives regarding mentorship of undergraduate mentees at the University of Houston, one of the most ethnically diverse national universities.

In September, Dr. Shine Chang and Dr. Kayce Solari Williams (UHAND Education Program codirectors) presented a poster on "Innovation in Learning: Recruiting and Preparing the Next Generation of Scientist-Advocates in Cancer Health Disparities" at the <u>2019 International</u> Cancer Education Conference (ICEC) in Salt Lake City, Utah.

#### **PILOT 3 ANNOUNCEMENT**

UHAND Principal Investigators, Dr. Lorraine Reitzel and Dr. Lorna McNeill, have worked with MD Anderson's Duncan Family Institute (DFI) to review applications for the UHAND Program's third pilot project. This third pilot is a collaboration between UHAND and the DFI to provide a combined \$100,000 seed funding opportunity.

After careful review, we are excited to announce that <u>Dr. Guang Peng</u> (Associate Professor at MD Anderson) and <u>Dr. Xinli Liu</u> (Associate Professor at the University of Houston) will be leading our third pilot: "<u>Novel Formulation of Synthetic Retinoid for Chemoprevention</u>." This study seeks to address the greater incidence and death rates due to breast cancer in African American women. One factor contributing to these disparate rates is that African American women have a higher prevalence of developing triple-negative breast cancer (TNBC), a type of breast cancer for which there currently lacks preventive therapy options. Consequently, Dr. Peng and Dr. Liu's project will test the efficacy of a topical preventive therapy for TNBC, which would help address breast cancer disparities in high-risk African American women.
